

2016 Town of Silverthorne Town Council Candidates

Russ Camp

Russ Camp has served on the Silverthorne Town Council for the past two years, following seven years on the Silverthorne Planning Commission, eleven years on the Snake River Planning Commission and a dozen years on the Summit County Open Space Advisory Council.

While on Council, Russ has also served as the Council representative to the Economic Development Advisory Committee (EDAC), Silverthorne Parks, Open Space, Recreation and Trails Committee (SPORT), and the Joint Sewer Authority (JSA).



Russ sees developing a vibrant town core as a top priority for the Town of Silverthorne and believes we are headed in the right direction with the following town initiatives Russ would like to see through to completion:

- The new performing arts center in partnership with the Lake Dillon Theatre Company
- Several new eateries opened or approved including Bakers' Brewery, Starbucks, Dunkin' Donuts, Sauce on the Blue, and Angry James Brewery
- Additional bed base including the newly opened Hampton Inn
- Amended zoning regulations to encourage retail, restaurant and hotel businesses in the town core
- A public process for re-branding the town in conjunction with our marketing consultant Betty Ashley

While the town's current focus is on establishing the town core, previous efforts have resulted in top-notch recreational amenities including the recently expanded Silverthorne Recreation Center, Rainbow Park, the Blue River Trail, and several neighborhood parks. Russ believes it is important to continue to support these amenities including completion of the final section of the Blue River Trail planned for 2016/2017, the redevelopment and expansion of Trent Park and redevelopment of Artie Placer Park.

Russ also believes workforce housing needs to be an integral part of our plan as we move forward with the development of Silverthorne.

Finally, we cannot forget the ongoing base businesses of municipal government-keeping our community safe and providing public roads, water and sewer, and other infrastructure, all within a balanced budget.

Russ is seeking a second term on the Silverthorne Town Council because he feels the town needs consistent leadership that connects where we have been with where we are going. Russ believes his current experience as a Council member coupled with prior service on two planning commissions and multiple homeowners' association boards provide the background and experience needed to help the Town of Silverthorne move forward.

Russ is a nine-year resident of our town and a twenty-year resident of Summit County. Prior experience includes forty years in manufacturing and thirty-one years of ski instruction.

Then we go on to Parks, Open Space and Environmentality friendly development and redevelopment. There are areas that will be developed or redeveloped in the not too




distant future and we need to make sure this is done with our eyes wide open to the vision of the future benefit of the Town.
